On August 28th through the 30th, Fort Nathan Hale hosted the first multi-faceted Civil War Re-enactment on the East Coast. With the help of The Schooner *John Paul Jones*, and a complement of 200 Civil War re-enactors, the siege of "Port Royal" was staged at adjacent Nathan Hale Park.

Confederate troops who held the high ground with a section of battery (cannons), were able to hold off a Federal assault that left many casualties on Saturday and again on Sunday. The Schooner *John Paul Jones* cruised back and forth before the confederate guns firing on their emplacements with Fort Nathan Hale's 6-pounder gun to "soften up" the landing area for the Union troops, all to no avail.

As the action took place on the "heights" the Fort's gift shop was open and doing business, as was the Boy Scout Troop at the base of the hill providing hot dogs, hamburgers and soft drinks to the crowds that came to the event. A U.S. Army National Guard recruiting tent was also a part of the days' events manned with four recruiters who had information to pass out to the public.

An "embedded " reporter, Kent Pierce of WTNH Channel 8, was on hand all day to provide coverage of the event via "wireless" visual telegraph for two days running. His reports in "period clothing" were broadcast on Thursday before the event, Saturday during the event, and all day on Sunday. This drew crowds of over 4,000 to Sunday's Sunday's finale.
